

## FILLED WITH GEMS FROM DAY ONE

### JEWELLERY QUARTER – FROM COUNTRY ESTATE TO CENTRE OF INNOVATION



In 1980 we were in need of a couple of wedding rings. Being relatively new to Birmingham I asked work colleagues where the Jewellery Quarter was - but no one really knew. In the 1980s the Jewellery Quarter was not a place many visited unless you worked there. In the end, armed with the name Warstone Lane, we found ourselves in Rob Turley's workshop. He sorted us a couple of rings, selling them to us after first placing them on a pan balance and checking the price of gold with a quick phone call.

Birmingham is known as a city of continuous change and this is certainly reflected in the history of the Jewellery Quarter. In medieval times this was the grounds of St Thomas' Priory, sold on by Henry VIII after the reformation and becoming the country estate of the Colmore family. In the Georgian period the Colmores moved to London, dividing their land into development leasehold plots as they left. From the early Victorian period the Quarter was built on local inventiveness and entrepreneurship. Larger factories developed, often producing small metal items, known as 'Birmingham toys', for sale across the world.

The success of Birmingham still includes the historical ability to start up a business based on innovative ideas. George and Henry Elkington provide an impressive example which changed the world. The Elkington cousins realised that traditional Jewellery Quarter methods of




Colmore Estate, 1730: The family estate of the Colmore family with their home Newhall still visible with its tree-lined boulevard

manufacturing plated-ware were hazardous to health.

They set up a small factory in Newhall Street with new plating processes, using boiling solutions of metal salts.

Then, bringing together the ideas of others including Volta and Faraday, they finally invented electroplating. In September 1840 with patent No. 8447 in place they built huge factories to commercialise their inventions. Indeed, your mobile phone, filled with its electroplated components, works due to Birmingham's Jewellery Quarter!

Inventiveness moving to mass production was seen in other areas, for example techniques for mechanical pen nib manufacture saw Birmingham's Jewellery Quarter...



...dominating world production for many years.
At its height as many as 30,000 people worked in
Jewellery Quarter industries. While many were employed
in large factories, around fifty percent were either selfemployed or worked in smaller family businesses. As the
Quarter developed the pressure on industrial space saw
residential developments, such as the estate of Colonel
Vyse around Pitsford Street, converted for industrial use,
with extensions and 'shopping' the name for smaller
factory units built in courtyards to increase production
space.

This fine-grain street scene that can be experienced today has been retained in part due to the designation of the Quarter as an Urban Village in the later part of the twentieth century. The modern Jewellery Quarter is Europe's largest centre of jewellery production, with the Birmingham Assay Office hallmarking around 12 million items a year.


Developments today aim to ensure that unique aspects are retained as the Quarter plays a key role in the modern city. Certainly, continued success will depend on ensuring that it is a place that sees innovative ideas and ways of working as central to the future.



## THE COFFIN WORKS EST 1894

Sarah Hayes, Museum Director (Coffin Works)

#### Not many places have a museum dedicated to coffins, can you tell us a little bit about the Coffin Works and its history?

The museum is actually all about coffin fittings, so rather than the coffin itself, it's focussed on the adornments such as the handles, plates and ornaments. But the main reason I love it is because it's a time capsule! It preserves the contents of the former Newman Brothers' Coffin Fittings manufactory established in 1894. It's a remarkable survival of not only the contents, but also the building itself and the machinery, much of it still in working action.

It's also the only surviving example of a purpose bult Victorian coffin fittings manufactory in the country, made even more special owing to the fact that Birmingham was the centre of this trade. And Newman Brothers didn't just make any old coffin fittings, they made the very best and supplied the royal undertakers for most of the 20th century. Many a king, queen and prime ministers' coffins were adorned with fittings from this factory in Birmingham. So, the factory for me really emphasises Birmingham's industrial dominance and its position as the city of a 1000 trades.

#### What's your insider tip for the new resident or business to the JQ?

I think being willing to partner with other businesses and not seeing them as competition, but as allies, is key. We're stronger together and one of the Coffin Works' aims this year is to work with a diverse group of businesses, not just heritage organisations and develop our events offering.

#### Why do you love the JQ?

My first museum job was here, I was a tour guide at the Museum of the Jewellery Quarter whilst I was at Uni. It got me hooked and the JQ feels like it's part of my DNA now. I've seen it change so much and for me, always for the better. Part of the reason I love my job so much at Coffin Works is its location. It's 'town' but 'not town', as it's a slower pace of life and the JQ community is what makes it special.

#### You've got an hour to relax, tell me how you'd spend it?

I'm grabbing a coffee from Urban Emporiums and then going for a walk through Warstone Lane Cemetery or Key Hill Cemetery. I particularly love it in the spring when the bluebells are out. There's a spot in Key Hill that I visited a lot during lockdown and when the sun is shining it's a sanctuary.

#### If you want to grab a low-key dinner, where would you go?

I've got to say it has to be Arch 13. I love how friendly the team are, it is well priced and dog friendly too! I don't think there's anywhere quite like it in Brum, and I always take family who are visiting from out of town to this spot.



#### Where do you shop if you're picking up a gift or two?

Sticking with the same spot, I always head to Connolly's in Arch 13 to grab a bottle of wine. An added bonus is that I can get Ed's advice on the latest beers he's tried or wines he's recommending.

#### And finally, where are you taking me for a drink?

I love an old building and The Shakespeare on Summer Row is exactly that so it has to be there. It's over 150 years old and you can see that charm inside the building with its slightly crooked floor and original features. Its not just the interior that has a warmth and charm though, the team always make you feel welcome and the beer selection is second to none.

Sonal Clare, Wine Director at The Wilderness Restaurant



#### How much of an influence has the JQ been on your business?

It's hard to imagine us being anywhere else. Our restaurant is pretty different from the standard fine-dining restaurant — being in an old factory is a massive part of that. Most of our team live in the JQ too so it's very much the centre of our universe. Guests travelling from outside Birmingham love the fact that we're here in this weird mix of old and new — it gets them to spend time in a super interesting part of the city.

#### And why do you personally love the JQ?

It's an energy. The JQ might be just a 10 minute walk from the city centre, but it's light and day. We do things more relaxed here — and there's lots of green space when you need a moment. There's also lots of great spots for a drink, or three.

#### Favourite restaurant?

My Mum is in Wolverhampton so I often jump on a tram from the JQ and go see her — there's lots of great Desi pubs there! In the JQ — I can't say The Wilderness can I? — Hockley Social is pretty cool, and there's variety there.

#### I need a great Birmingham gift, where should I go shopping?

Arch 13 is 5 minutes from my house and has lots of good wine. Who doesn't love wine? Get wine.

#### Finally, where are you taking me for a drink?

Arch 13 for just a glass, or Actress & Bishop — I've been known to be there til the early hours after service. Close to work, close to my apartment, open late. It's a winning combination.

#### What makes the JQ unique?

It's a neighbourhood unlike any other in Brum. Community is at the heart of everything. You're just outside of the city centre but you also have everything you need on your doorstep. I think most people that work or live in the JQ just want to see it thrive, the people here support their local indies and it shows by how many small businesses are opening. At the same time, it remains a retreat away from the hustle and bustle of the city and life is just a little more relaxed around here.

#### Favourite restaurant?

There are so many, but right now it's got to be Folium. Lucy and Ben are incredible, Ben is cooking at the very top of the game at the moment and Lucy is an absolute front of house superstar. It's a treat for sure but I can't recommend it enough.



#### Where are you taking me for a drink?

We could go for a cocktail or several at Lucky 7. Rob and Kyndra produce some sensational drinks, and they're open on Mondays, that's a win in my book.

#### You've got 1 hour to relax, tell me how you'd spend it?

I'm going to see the ladies at Nails Bab to get my trotter hands taken care of. They're absolute artists in that place, even went there for my wedding nails.


Finally I'm also part of a maker-collective called Quartermasters, working on a whole host of projects with established JQ makers Tina Francis and Frilly Industries

You've got an hour to relax, how are you


#### spending it?






